The night was a low key affair with no formality, after meeting in the Bar we all sat down to a feast with many having seconds.

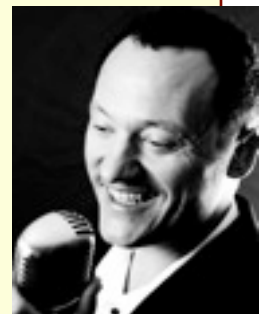
The lovely girls I had met previously in Bournemouth sold raffle tickets for the main event.
